ITEM 7. Report from Sherry Campbell regarding Hogs N Hot Rods.

This year's event had many challenges to overcome from the very beginning. Time being our biggest challenge. We came into this event in early April already more than 4 months behind where we should have

been. We put together a committee of 10 or so people who had previously been involved in the planning and organizing of the event in various time periods. We had those who had started the event in the very beginning, like Brad Francis, Tharyn Nachtigall, and Preston Haley. We had some who had been involved in the decade post 2010, and then some who had been a part in more recent years. We each had a common desire to not see the event die and to bring it back bigger and better than ever. Our tagline became bringing it back old school, to what it used to be in the beginning! We decided early on that we would like to dedicate this year's show to our Veterans, and it was decided that 10% of all shirt sales would go to our local American Legion Post #2 and VFW Post #3077.

Our first stop was meeting with Michael Steel at Bottoms Up Chop Shop. We asked him to oversee the bike portion of the show and he was excited to do that.

We worked with Tyson Baker at REACH Clothing to come up with a t-shirt design that we felt honored our Veterans and would be a great seller. It took a little bit to get it put together but when we reached the final draft everyone agreed it was the perfect shirt. Tyson Baker and his graphic artist, Matthew Simmons were a pleasure to work with to come up with the perfect design.

Our next obstacle to overcome was the fact that in recent years the show had lost credibility among the car clubs and car enthusiasts. We had to make them feel welcome and appreciated. We went from the 5 classes being judged in recent years to 60 classes to be more inviting to many more vehicles. Let me tell you, it worked! Just as was done many, many years ago we followed the Route 66 Blowout car show of Sapulpa when coming up with our classes.

The next obstacle became finding judges who would be fair and non-biased and who were willing to work with the Hogs 'N' Hot Rods committee again. Many car folks had sworn off coming to this event again and we had to make sure we had a good group of judges. We ended up with the Dragin Masters Car Club which was established in 1958. They were a great group of car buffs to work with. They had 4 teams of 3 judges, and we were able to provide each team with a gold cart provided as sponsorship from Rob's Auto Sales in Skiatook. He donated 5 golf carts total which was priceless in the heat that day.

The first 250 registered entrants received a custom dash plaque with the Hogs 'N' Hot Rods logo on them. All our registered vehicles were given an insulated lunch bag filled with goodies also provided by Christine Wilson at Hometown Insurance. Registered participants also received a ticket to partake in the VIP Hospitality Room which was a cool place for them to take a break and have a bite to eat and cold water. The food was provided by El Jalapeno Grill as their sponsorship for the event. Volunteers overseeing the Hospitality Room were from the American Legion Unit #2 Auxiliary with help from Marsha Nachtigall. The Hospitality Room is a bonus that sets us apart from other car shows and we received many compliments and kudos.

We had some great things in the works that unfortunately had to be cancelled at the last minute due to unforeseen circumstances. One being the PBR mechanical Bull. We have them booked for next year already though.

From the time we advertised Under New Management we had many people interested in the event. Our committee passed out flyers at all the area car shows, cruises, and any other car or bike related event we could find. That too worked to our favor. To be able to offer a personal invitation to our show paid off. We got many entries from the passed-out flyers. We were competing with Broken Arrow's Rooster Days and a couple of other cars shows and events.

We were hoping for 300 entries and had about 140 pre-registered entries before the event. When the event started, we ran out of Dash Cards and made several trips to make change. Armstrong Bank provided 6 volunteers who-rocked the registration table. As a diamond sponsor they wanted to be involved in a way other

than sitting at a booth all day. We could not have asked for better volunteers. Commissioner Sagi was also at the registration booth, and he was instrumental in keeping things rolling. They had it down and hardly had time to catch their breath. They ended up registering over 328 vehicles. We had many people come to just “show” their cars and did not wish to be judged. They were charged the entry fee to be able to park within the event. There were easily close to if not more than 400 vehicles. The cars extended all the way from 7<sup>th</sup> Street to in front of the library. Including the side streets of 10<sup>th</sup>, N. 11<sup>th</sup>, and S. 12<sup>th</sup> Street. We could have extended west even further had there not been a funeral going on that morning. Everyone was excited to be a part of the new “old school” Hogs ‘N’ Hot Rods car & bike show. We had many cars come from far away but the furthers entry came from Antlers, OK which was 148 miles away. We had many in the crowd tell us they had traveled to come to the show. One person from Illinois traveled over 8 1/2hours and planned their trip around being able to attend our show. He stated that he hopes to be back next year.

The Assembly of God Church provided a grassy area behind the tri-County fair barns that was used for the Kids Zone. Treasured Pediatrics sponsored 3 inflatable waterslides for the Kids Zone.

The Hogs ‘N’ Hot Rods Facebook page was being updated throughout the day with fun videos and photos from Socials by Kenz who we met at the June Chamber of Commerce Luncheon. She did a fantastic job documenting the day.

The weather did not do us any favors and it was extremely hot. The awards ceremony took place at 3:00 and was slightly delayed as the judges had to go back out to judge in the instance of several ties. During the delay, Cox Communications announced how excited they are to be coming to Collinsville and recognized the Veterans Employee division of their company by giving a \$2000 donation to both our local American Legion and VFW Commanders. It was a surprise as no one knew exactly how much their donation was going to be. We were all shocked and very grateful.

The awards ceremony was very hot, but everyone seemed to enjoy it. Michael Steel from Bottoms Up Chop Shop had two very nice trophies commissioned that were presented with a \$250 CASH prize provided by Scotty’s Muffler and Tire to the Best of Show Car and Bike entries. A \$100 CASH prize was also provided by the Hopper Group with RE/MAX as part of their \$1000 Platinum sponsorship. The crowd picked up the ballots at the RE/MAX booth and returned it marked with their favorite show entry.

The success of the show was truly a team effort. The City may have headed up the show, but it was the community who opened their arms and welcomed everyone with hospitality and gave them an enjoyable experience while visiting our city. We had city staff on site for all day helping with set-up, tear-down, and trash control. Our electric guys were onsite to help food vendors get set up properly. We had boy scout troop #44 there at 6:00 AM to help vendors get their tents set-up. The Masonic Lodge was there first thing at 6:00 AM and provided volunteers to help with parking cars. We tried something new this year had recycling bins provided on every corner to collect plastic bottles and aluminum cans. They were used and the public was very conscience about putting the recyclables in the correct place. We had a total of 40 volunteers that day who received a free t-shirt for their service.

It was a success because of all our sponsors, our volunteers, city staff and the citizens of Collinsville.
